



California Supreme Court Justice Kelli Evans to Keynote **CWL Annual Conference**

She has received numerous awards and recognition including the King Hall Distinguished Alumna Award, the Stanford Trailblazer Award, Judge of the Year Award, Attorney General's Award for Exceptional Service, State Bar President's Award, and a Medal of Achievement from the Washington Metropolitan Police Department.

is important. "Diversity and representation helps improve decision-making," she said. Evans said she hopes her appointment sends a message to LGBTQ+ kids and families who may fear the increase in hate crimes and legislation that is hostile to the LGBTQ+ community.

"You can be out, you can live your authentic life and thrive personally and professionally at the highest levels," she said.

Evans grew up in Denver, raised by her grandmother in public housing. She came to California for college and stayed, receiving her undergraduate degree from Stanford University and her law degree from the University of California at Davis.

She served as associate director of the ACLU of Northern California from 2010 to 2013, then worked for the State Bar of California as senior director for the administration of justice from 2014 to 2017, before joining the California Department of Justice as Special Assistant to the Attorney General, focusing on criminal justice, public safety, and civil rights law and policy from 2017 to 2019.

Appointed to the Alameda County Superior Court in June 2021, Evans presided over criminal and civil cases. When she was appointed to the Supreme Court, she took the seat left vacant when Justice Patricia Guerrero was elevated to Chief Justice.

CWL to Honor Gloria Allred with Fay Stender Award at Annual Dinner



will honor renowned attorney, feminist, and civil rights attorney Gloria Allred with the Fay Stender Award at the CWL Annual Dinner September 21 in San Diego.

CWL established the Fay Stender Award in 1982 in honor of Fay Stender, a Bay Area attorney who spent much of her professional life fighting for prisoners' rights. This annual award is given to a feminist attorney, who, like Stender,

Allred's other notable accolades include being inducted into the National Women's Hall of Fame in Seneca Falls, New York in 2019 and receiving the Lifetime Achievement Award from American Lawyer Magazine in 2020. Allred was honored with the Praeses Elit Award from Trinity College Dublin Law Society in 2021 in recognition of the advancements she has made for women's rights and civil rights throughout her career.

In 1976 and shortly after passing the California bar, Allred co-founded the law firm Allred, Maroko & Goldberg in Los Angeles and began taking on cases involving sexual harassment, workplace discrimination, and domestic violence. Her legal victories in these cases not only provided justice for her clients but also set important legal precedents that have shaped the field of employment and gender discrimination law.

Later in her legal career, Allred's involvement in cases against powerful public figures, including celebrities and politicians accused of sexual misconduct, helped her become a voice for survivors, highlighting issues that are often ignored or hidden. Her media presence has helped raise awareness about such topics often considered off-limits.

She fights for the rights of women in the workplace and represents victims of sexual assault and harassment. Allred's dedication to reproductive rights and bodily autonomy has also made her a leading figure in the ongoing battle for women's equality.

> Over the span of her legal career, Allred has received numerous awards and recognitions, such as the Lifetime Achievement Award from the National Trial Lawyers for her role in combating injustices and winning new rights, especially for women and minorities. In 2018, she was honored with a Lifetime Achievement Award from the National Organization for Women for her long-standing commitment to fighting injustices against women. That same year, Netflix launched "Seeing Allred," an original documentary about Allred and her battles for justice, which is still streaming on the platform.

- The Fay Stender Award recognizes a demonstrated commitment to underrepresented or disadvantaged groups or unpopular causes, a feminist perspective, and a demonstrated ability to effect change.
- The Judith Soley Lawyer as Citizen Award recognizes an accomplished attorney who has demonstrated leadership and significant ongoing community involvement.
- The Joan Dempsey Klein Award is presented each year to an outstanding jurist in Southern California with a record of longstanding and/or groundbreaking public service.
- The Rose Bird Memorial Award is presented each year to an exceptional jurist in Northern California who has a record of longstanding and/or groundbreaking public service.

Nomination packages, which must be submitted online, may not exceed 30 pages total. Nomination packages must include:

- 1. the nominee's resume, bio or CV;
- 2. a high-resolution color photo of the nominee;
- 3. a letter of support describing how the nominee meets the award criteria (5 pages maximum);
- 4. a statement from the nominating organization acknowledging the ability to assign one to two members who will actively participate with the CWL Award Committee in planning and marketing the award ceremony; and
- 5. a statement affirming the nominating organization will work with CWL to determine the nominee's availability for the award ceremony or In Conversation With webinar.

Nomination packages also may include up to five additional letters of support (maximum of 2 pages each) and up to three news articles written by or about the nominee.

Don't forget to vote for your CWL District Governor! Voting for District 4 (one of two seats): the election for CWL Board of Governors closes September 14 San Francisco and Marin Counties at 5 p.m.

Eligible CWL members should have received an email with a link to vote in their districts - either place of residence or principal business office.

Ten candidates are running for eight District Governor seats. The newly elected District Governors, who serve two-year terms and may serve for up to three consecutive terms, will be sworn in at the CWL Annual Dinner September 21 in San Diego, and will take office in January 2024.

The candidates for District Governor are:

District 2 (one seat):

Alpine, Amador, Calaveras, El Dorado, Napa, Sacramento, Solano, Sonoma, Tuolumne and Yolo Counties



Jennifer Hartman King is seeking a third term as District 2 Governor. She is the founder and President of Hartman King PC in Sacramento, where she represents clients in environmental and regulatory matters, including providing regulatory advice, developing and implementing

compliance programs, litigating disputes in state and federal court, defending government enforcement actions, advising on site investigation and remediation, handling environmental due diligence in mergers and acquisitions, and representing clients in real estate matters involving contaminated property. CWL Joins Amicus Brief in Sexual Harassment Case

The brief, filed by the National Women's Law Center (NWLC) and CWL had joined an amicus brief filed in the Supreme Court in the Washington Employment Lawyers Association, was filed the 303 Creative case in August 2022. That brief, filed by the in support of Sheila LaRose, a former public defender who National Women's Law Center on behalf of 35 organizations experienced sexual harassment, including stalking, by a former committed to civil rights for women and LGBTQ+ people, had client. Her employer had no sex harassment policy and took no argued, among other things, that the First Amendment does not action for months after she reported the harassment. LaRose won exempt businesses from compliance with public accommodation a multi-million-dollar judgment against King County, and the laws and highlighted the harms that would be caused if the Court County appealed. allowed such an exemption.

The amicus brief highlighted that employers are required to protect workers from workplace-related harassment by third parties, even if the harassment occurs outside the bounds of a physical place of employment. The brief emphasized that limiting protections solely to a physical place of employment ignores both the types of harassment workers face as well as the parameters of today's work environments. The brief also underscored that requiring a more burdensome approach than informing a direct supervisor of workplace discrimination, such as informing top or "upper" management, would create even more barriers to reporting discrimination and frustrate the purpose of workplace civil rights laws.

Amicus Losses in Both 303 Creative and Students for Fair Admissions

The U.S. Supreme Court issued unfavorable rulings in June in two cases in which CWL had joined amicus briefs.

In 303 Creative v. Elenis, 143 S. Ct. 2298 (2023), the Supreme Court held that a graphic designer, who sought to begin creating wedding websites, may deny service to same-sex couples who seek to create websites for their weddings. The 6-3 majority opinion issued June 30, held that, because 303 Creative offers services that are customized and expressive, the Free Speech Clause of the First Amendment shields the business from a generally applicable law that prohibits discrimination in the sale of publicly available goods and services.

In Students for Fair Admissions v. President and Fellows of Harvard College, 143 S. Ct. 2141 (2023), the Supreme Court held that the admissions programs at Harvard College and the University of North Carolina violate the equal protection clause of the 14th Amendment. The 6-3 majority opinion overruled 45 years of precedent established in prior Supreme Court decisions, including Regents of the University of California v. Bakke, Grutter v. Bollinger, and Fisher v. University of Texas.

Justice Sonia Sotomayor read her dissent from the bench, stating, "At bottom, the six unelected members of today's majority upend the status quo based on their policy preferences about what race in America should be like, but is not, and their preferences for a veneer of colorblindness in a society where race has always mattered and continues to matter in fact and in law."

CWL had joined an amicus brief filed in the Supreme Court in Students for Fair Admissions in August 2022 by the National Women's Law Center. In the brief, amici argued that affirmative action policies are necessary for addressing race and sex discrimination based on stereotypes and the effects of historic and current discrimination that uniquely harm women of color. The brief highlighted how women of color continue to remain underrepresented in higher education and across various fields, noting the intersecting ways that racism and sexism create harms, and the specific stereotypes tied to combined racial and sexual identities.
